

GACC Committees by Gwen Springmeyer

Avenues Grants – This committee receives and reviews applications from Avenues residents to provide funds to complete Community Improvement Projects.

Housing and Land Use Committee – This committee reviews zoning variances and follows other Land Use issues focusing on updating the Avenues Master Plan.

Events and Activities:

Avenues Athletic League - This committee was formed by the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints in partnership with the GACC. It has been inactive for three years but will likely start again next year. They ran three leagues: volleyball, basketball,

Avenues Choir - The Choir does a free Holiday concert every year and functions with the support of the GACC. Everyone can join with no audition or fees.

Memory Grove – The Committee plans for and conducts the Annual Memory Grove Clean-Up every spring.

Popperton Plots Community Garden - This group coordinates with Wasatch Community Gardens to manage the garden.

Street Fair – This Committee organizes the annual street fair on the second Saturday of September.

Board Operations:

Civic Engagement - The Committee seeks to get more people involved in our community by promoting increased interaction between our elected representatives & the public, including voter registration, meet the candidates' events, and civics literacy. Memory Grove Foundation - This group advocates for preserving, maintaining, and enhancing Memory Grove.

Orange Crossing Flags – This committee supplies the orange flags for the flag holders at the intersections.

Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) – This committee promotes training for volunteers to help their communities survive disasters, such as significant earthquakes, severe storms, or major flooding. They organize a community emergency preparedness fair and coordinate with the SLC Office of Emergency Management.


Wildfire Preparedness - The mission is to educate Avenues residents about the dangers of wildfire within our community and to help them prevent, prepare, and mitigate. This group coordinates various programs and events with the City Council and the Fire Department.

Communication:

Newsletter – These volunteers coordinate the publication of a monthly newsletter mailed to all Avenues residents.

Social Media – The committee manages posting to the GACC Facebook and Instagram pages.

Website Management – These volunteers directly update GACC website content and oversee communication and account maintenance with third-party service providers.

Unmasking the Badger

Badgers appear prominently in lore across diverse cultures. While we identify with their characters in stories (such as Mr. Badger from The Wind and the Willows) would you know a badger if you saw one? Did you know that badgers inhabit the Salt Lake City Foothills?

The American Badger is a member of the Mustelidae, a diverse family of carnivorous mammals that includes weasels, otters, ferrets and wolverines. The badger's range spans the western, central and northeastern United States, and from northern Mexico to central and southwestern Canada. They inhabit relatively dry locations, including grasslands, forests of juniper, gamble oak, ponderosa pine and sagebrush.

Badgers are stocky. They are usually 23-30 inches long and weigh 14-19 pounds. Their short powerful legs and long claws are ideal for digging their burrows. With thick tan-gray coats, badgers are easily recognized by the distinctive white stripe that runs from their black snout over their head.

Badgers eat a variety of rodents, snakes (including rattlesnakes) and other prey that they dig out from underground. They will enlarge other animals' dens to make their own burrows where they can safely sleep, be protected from weather, avoid larger predators and raise their young.

Amazingly, badgers and coyotes will hunt together to improve their success rates. When a badger flushes a rodent out of its hole, the coyote may catch it as it runs to get away. And when a coyote chases an animal into its hole, the badger can grab it. Some badger populations are designated threatened. Fragmentation of their habitats has resulted in loss of adequate available prey and fresh water sources causing their numbers to decline.

While we don't often encounter badgers our activities can impact their lives greatly. Preservation of our natural lands protects the habitats of our native species.

- -Crews will continue to perform construction activities for the new permanent retaining wall at the water treatment plant parking lot.
- -Crews will continue mechanical and electrical modifications to the existing filter building.
- -Removal of existing equipment and structures will continue at various locations throughout the construction site.
- -Construction equipment will continue to be transported throughout the canyon to prepare the construction site for upcoming activities.





Have you noticed the new EV Rivion - Amazon delivery vans? They're amazing!


The Annual Battle of Books!
