Chair's Message for September

September is TRANSPORTATION Month

Last month we focused on housing by discussing what makes the Avenues unique. We learned about our history and talked about what we value as a community. This month our attention goes to transportation. Our streets and avenues are not the same as the rest of the City, and we balance our residential neighborhood between a busy downtown on one end and an ever-changing University on the other. We have unique transportation challenges for buses, personal vehicles, bicycles, and pedestrians. This summer, we have endured utility construction and road resurfacing. We are just now recognizing the impact of a significant bus rerouting. We are in the middle of transportation issues impacting our lives.



Jon Larsen is the director of the Salt Lake City Transportation Division. At our September meeting, he will communicate with us about the City's Transportation Master Plan. He will be there to answer our questions so ask him the hard ones. Jon will be able to talk about the re-construction of Virginia Street, which is planned for 2024. He can report on the recent survey and what residents want for this important street. Although it is not a Salt Lake City Transportation project, he will be happy to report the completion of the Public Utilities Water and Sewer project that has blocked access to the Avenues from State Street and North Temple. Jon can also tell us about the new 20 MPH speed zones approved by the Salt Lake City Council earlier this summer. This impacts approximately 70% of the City's public streets and most of the roads on the Avenues. The City is replacing approximately 575 signs from 25 to 20 miles per hour. Watch for it to happen on your street. But 20 MPH speed signs don't save lives. Each one of us needs to make a commitment to slow down, stay alert and never drive under the influence.

The Avenues supports the Orange Flag Pedestrian crosswalk flag program. For information about adopting an intersection and getting a supply of crosswalk flags, please contact Jill Van Langeveld at jill.van@hotmail.com or 801-201-3415.

In the first week of August, UTA implemented significant changes to the bus routes on the Avenues. Many Avenues residents are struggling with changes to the streets used by the buses, the duration (4:30 am to midnight), and the frequency (every 15 minutes). FOOTHILL FORUM

Flight of the Monarch and Native Utah Milkweed

The annual migration of the Western Monarch butterfly is a remarkable journey. Wintering on the California coast, Western Monarchs migrate in the spring across most of the western states, including Utah, in search of the only plant that can play host to Monarch caterpillars: milkweed. Toxic chemicals present in milkweed render the butterflies poisonous to birds and other predators! When milkweed are readily



available, this presents Monarchs with an amazing evolutionary advantage. When milkweed is scarce, its absence can spell disaster for Monarchs. There has been a long-term decline of the Monarch butterfly population in recent decades, and Monarchs were recently placed on the list of endangered species.

Utah is a great place to see migrating Monarchs; at least fifteen species of milkweed are native to Utah. Spider milkweed (*Asclepias asperula*), also known as Antelope Horns, grow in the Salt Lake City Foothills. Look for them as you hike. Their beautiful white-and-burgundy flowers appear from May to July.



More than beautiful, Monarch Butterflies contribute to the health of the planet. Butterflies—along with other pollinators like birds, bats and bees—are vital in creating and maintaining the habitats that many animals (including humans) rely on for food and shelter.

Let's continue to protect our natural lands—and the plants and animals that call them home.

Salt Lake City Transportation Master Plan

The Transportation Division at Salt Lake City is currently in the process of updating their Transportation Master Plan. Rather than a laundry list of projects, the plan is intended to be a guiding policy document that lays out how and why we utilize our sidewalks and bike and road networks. We hope to make all of our infrastructure projects (sometimes literal) concrete examples of the goals and values of Salt Lake City's residents. To this end we have designed a process that starts with the community. In addition to hundreds of hours of community events and thousands of survey responses, our work employs a team of nine paid citizen advisors, representing a broad spectrum of those who live, work and go to school in Salt Lake City. From this engagement we have learned that that plan should focus on the areas of sustainability, reliability, safety and health, affordability and equity. Currently we are in the process of translating these values into transportation policy, with the hope of a draft plan in the coming months.

Virginia Street Project Update

Thank you to the 250 Avenues residents that took Salt Lake City's Virginia Street Reconstruction Project survey this past April and May. The project will be constructed in 2024 between South Temple and 11 th Ave.

Common issues identified by survey respondents were speeding, traffic noise, poor walking experience, missing sidewalks and too few places to cross the street, diverse problems related to the curve in the street between 1 st and 2 nd Avenue, lack of bike lanes, inconsistent stop signs, and some poor sight lines at corners.

Your comments and ideas will make the project so much better. Over the next few months, the City's Transportation and Engineering Divisions will work on developing design solutions/recommendations for the issues that you identified. Then, we'll present that to the community within the next six months or so. We originally planned to do that in September, but given some staffing changes, we'll be just a little bit delayed.

State Street Waterline

Crews have been working hard this summer, replacing key public utilities along State Street between 200 N and 1 st Avenue as part of the State Street Waterline project. The over 100-year-old, 6-inch waterline in this area was updated to a 12-inch line with a new water main, adding resiliency to the greater Salt Lake City water system, in addition to various sewer updates along the corridor.

Overall, this project replaced 1450 feet of waterline, updated 950 feet of sewer, and updated 5 fire hydrants in the area.

We really appreciate the patience and understanding from the community during this work and are happy to report that **all lanes have been reopened now that the project is complete!** Stay up to date with the great work Salt Lake City Department of Public Utilities is doing at slc.gov/utilities or on Twitter @SLCPU.

Update to the City's Transportation Master Plan

In 2021, the Salt Lake City Transportation Division launched Connect SLC, an extensive process to update our last Transportation Master Plan from 1996. Like other Salt Lake City Master Plans, Connect SLC will result in a Transportation Master Plan (TMP) that outlines high-level transportation policy to be applied city-wide.

We recognize that transportation has a direct impact on equity and quality of life, ranging from housing, to economic development, to air quality, and more.

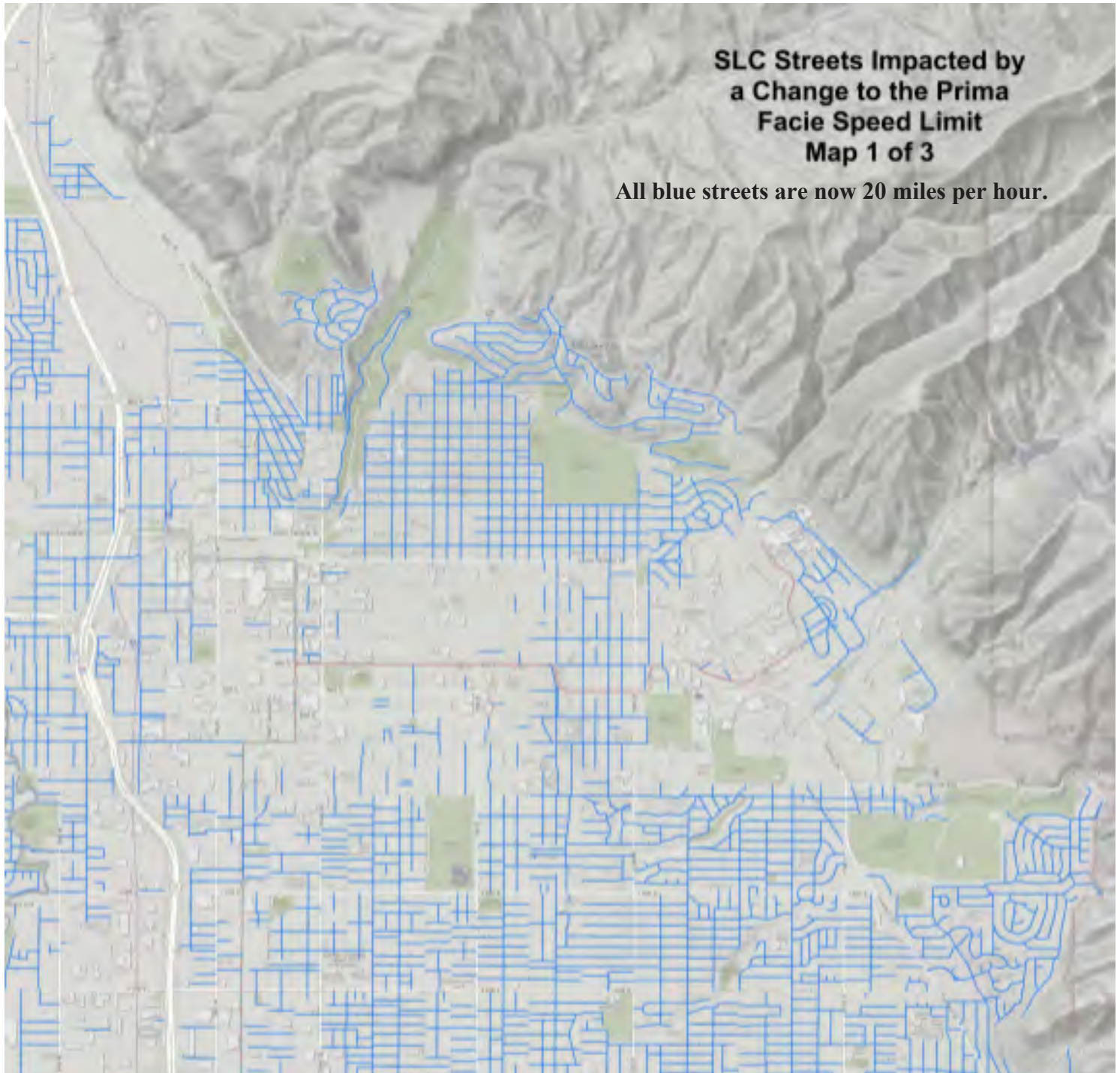
New 20 mph Speed Limit Covers All of Avenues

Salt Lake City has begun installing 20 miles per hour speed limit signs throughout the city, marking the final step of implementing a recently-adopted ordinance lowering the speed limit from 25 miles per hour on local streets to 20 miles per hour.

UDOT prefers Gondola for Little Cottonwood Canyon Traffic Reduction Plan

The Utah Department of Transportation (UDOT) began an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) in the spring of 2018 for Little Cottonwood Canyon (LCC) and Wasatch Boulevard in partnership with Utah Transit Authority (UTA) and the U.S. Department of Agriculture Forest Service to provide an integrated transportation system that improves the reliability, mobility and safety for residents, visitors, and commuters who use S.R. 210. The end goal is to deliver transportation options that meet the needs of the community while preserving the value of the Wasatch Mountains.

UDOT has released the Final EIS and 14,000 public comments received during the Draft EIS comment periods. Gondola Alternative B with proposed phasing has been identified as the preferred alternative in the Final EIS. A 45-day public review and comment period is open from Sept. 2 to Oct. 17, 2022. Salt Lake City Public Lands Glendale Regional Park Vision Plan

As the City decides what to do with the former Water Park on 1700 South and the Jordan River, over 1,700 people responded to the first round of public comment. Based on those comments, the City has released their initial vision plan.

Highlights of the plan include: Community gathering and event spaces, play places for all ages, water features including kayak rentals, a boat dock and ramp, and an outdoor pool, ice/roller skating, skateboarding and bike trails. Air Quality – Who wants to save some money?

Everybody is complaining about the high cost of gasoline, except those who drive electric cars. Is there anything we can do to save money? Yes: **Turn Your Key, Be Idle Free**. Really? *Yes, really!*

Whenever a vehicle's engine is on, but the vehicle is not in motion, it is *idling*. Although many individual idling episodes are small, the cumulative impacts of idling are large! Consider that idling in the United States uses **more than 6 billion gallons of fuel at a cost of more than \$20 billion to consumers and businesses EACH year** – without even moving! Roughly half of that fuel is wasted by passenger vehicles (cars and light trucks)

Argonne Laboratory does research for the U.S. Department of Energy's Office of Science. They found that idling is only fuel-efficient for approximately seven seconds—after that, it's better to shut off your engine.

They studied the idling fuel consumption rate with no load (no use of accessories such as air conditioners, fans, etc.) with different sized engines. They found that a 1-liter engine idling just 10 minutes per day would use about 10 gallons of fuel per year going nowhere. A 3-liter engine idling just 10 minutes per day would use about 30 gallons of fuel. A 5-liter engine would use almost 50

gallons per year. Now multiply by the amount you paid at the pump.

Those short idling times add up. How often and for how long do you idle? Have you ever added it up? I challenge you to do it for a week.

We all really need to turn off the engine whenever running it is unnecessary, such as while waiting to pick up children after school, waiting at long freight train crossings, or waiting for someone at the grocery store.

That being said, it is not recommended to turn your car on and off in stop-and-go traffic; driving safely means being able to respond quickly to traffic conditions. Many newer cars have "stop-start technology," so your car's engine automatically stops when you come to a stop and starts immediately when you put your foot on the gas. When you have that, you can ignore what I say because your car is already doing it for you and you don't have to think, **Turn Your Key, Be Idle Free**.

What about winter? Don't car engines need to be warmed up? Assuming that your windows are free of ice—safety first, of course—run the vehicle for about 30 seconds and drive gently (i.e., no hard acceleration). The engine will warm up more quickly by being "at work" than by idling, which will help the car's interior warm up more quickly. Also, the catalytic converter, which reduces harmful emissions, reaches operating temperature much more quickly if the car is driven rather than idled. Most auto manufacturers recommend against idling even on the coldest days.

As you see, the impacts of idling are substantial. The extra hours of engine operation also cost the owners money for frequent maintenance and overhauls. In addition, idling vehicles emit particulates (PM10), nitrogen dioxides (NO2), carbon monoxide (CO), and carbon dioxide (CO2).

So, when you avoid idling, you save money and avoid polluting the air we breathe. It's a WIN-WIN!

Considering an EV (Electric Vehicle)? You are NOT alone. The new "**Inflation Reduction Act**" is expected to lead to 600,000 EV sales over the next year. By 2030 over 50 percent of vehicles on the road will be EVs.

New car buyers are excited to learn that several great EVs are now priced far below the average price paid for a new gas vehicle. You may even qualify for up to a \$7,500 tax credit. Stop paying for gas! Make driving fun, in a quiet, spacious, and exciting way. For example, the 5 passenger, spacious, Ford Mustang Mach-e has a starting MSRP @\$36,500 (w/credit). That's almost \$10,000 below the average price paid for a new gas powered vehicle. There is a downside: expect an 8 -10 month wait.
